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

From the Director – Shana Higgins

The Armacost Library, the ‘learning commons’ of the University, supports the mission of the University of Redlands to “foster a community of scholars...to embrace a reflective understanding of our world” proceeding “from information to insight, from knowledge to meaning.” Through our strategic plan (2015-2020) we are supporting these goals.

Learning Technologies Initiative The learning technologies initiative aims to modernize the library’s technological infrastructure to enable better support for campus teaching and learning.

Library, Information Literacy and/in Curricular Innovation (LILCI) The LILCI initiative aims to strengthen collaborations with disciplinary faculty, and coordinate the library’s information literacy outcomes with relevant campus and disciplinary competencies, including the North Star institutional plan, program learning outcomes, the College of Arts & Sciences Liberal Arts Inquiry (LAI) general education model, AAC&U Essential Learning Outcomes, and WASC Core Competencies.

Redlands Open Scholarship Enterprise (ROSE) The ROSE initiative seeks to stimulate scholarship by increasing awareness of the open access (OA) movement and the wealth of available open educational resources, and by providing OA publishing opportunities through InSPIRE, the campus institutional repository.

Space Initiative The goal of the space initiative is to compile recommendations to realize the vision of an Armacost Library Learning Commons that meets the teaching and learning needs of the University community and supports the workflows of library employees.

During the AY 2016-2017, we made great strides in realizing the goals of our initiatives, two in particular. The Learning Technologies Initiative transitioned into a year-long implementation project, as we prepared for and migrated our integrated library system (ILS) to a new platform. All members of Armacost Library faculty and staff were involved in one or more implementation teams: Fulfillment & User Services (FUSE), Acquisitions & Resource Management (ARM), and Primo (the public-facing discovery layer).

We celebrated a successful migration to our new systems, ExLibris Alma/Primo on June 29, 2017. Pictured below, celebrating the first book checked out in new system.



The Space Initiative team’s research and recommendations were incorporated into the University-wide Learning Commons Working Group, as we began to imagine how to realize the Learning Commons vision of the North Star 2020 strategic plan.





InSPIRe@Redlands

Institutional Scholarly Publication and Information Repository

InSPIRe serves as both a library archive and publisher of university-related artifacts. This includes scholarship, creative work, special collections, and event material. As technologies expand and reshape the boundaries of scholarship, the Armacost Library will continue to work with researchers and artists to preserve and promote their work in ways that align with our professional values.

Contents are discoverable when searching major search engines like Google, and since its launch in the fall of 2013 InSPIRe has received worldwide attention. While nearly half of all downloads came from the United States, over one-quarter of downloads came from the United Kingdom, India, China, Canada, Philippines, Japan, Germany, Russian Federation, Netherlands, and France combined.

Once again, the Dene L. O'Connor's *Solid Waste Collection Vehicle Route Optimization for the City of Redlands, California* was the most downloaded paper with over 2500 downloads. The United States and India alone accounted for nearly half of all downloads.

Subscriptions Review

In Spring 2017, facing a reduced budget for AY 2017-2018, Armacost Library faculty reviewed for cost and use (cost-per-use), amongst other factors, our stand alone journal subscriptions, two "[big deal](#)" [journal packages](#) (Sage Premier, Wiley Database Model), and subscriptions we receive at a discount through SCEL (Statewide California Electronic Library Consortium). Armacost librarians review continuing resources on an annual basis with the goal of effectively supporting curriculum across the University.

Armcast Library's New Integrated Library System (ILS) is here

June 29, 2017, marked the launch of our new integrated library system, featuring a new search interface benefiting all library users, as well as a complete overhaul of our operations and behind-the-scenes technology infrastructure. This was the most significant milestone in an infrastructure project that the library has been undertaking in multiple phases over a three-year period, working closely with ITS, the Provost's Office and Budget and Finance. In the first phase, we evaluated the library's aging technology infrastructure, drafted a strategic plan to track our progress, and formed the partnerships we'd need for the successful implementation of a new system. During the second phase, we researched the library systems marketplace, put out a competitive RFP and negotiated a contract for our new system (Ex Libris Alma/Primo). In the third phase, we worked with Ex Libris to migrate our data and settings to the new system over a six-month period. All library employees committed to serving together on project teams, where we made key decisions about how we would use the new system and pored over hours of videos and technical documentation. The fourth phase, post-implementation, is still underway, as we continue to reimagine our processes and apply what we have learned to empower a new generation of students and researchers!

Library Gets New Elevator

The Armcast Building's north elevator rehab project was completed this year and our new elevator is working beautifully. The project began in December 2016 and was completed March of 2017.
